From the Mayor's Desk: Where has this year gone! Let's begin with our Water Improvement Project started in 2016. The initial project that included 1,000 radio read meters, 400,000 gallon water storage tank, new well house and well, over 25,000 linear feet of new and replacement 8" and 6" lines is now complete. System went on line July 19, 2018.

We just completed the North Oak water extension and all customers were moved to new 8 inch water line September 21, 2018.

Our engineers are preparing drawings to upgrade water lines from HWY 49B and HWY 49 south to Crain Road from 2 inch to 6 inch, East School Street from Davidson Lane east to our current city limits from 2 inch to 6 inch, and Eason Street from Maple Slough Ditch south to Three Notch Road from 2 inch to 6 inch. This line work will strengthen our water service infrastructure for future growth.

The Lestel Elder City Park is moving. The City of Brookland purchased 2+ acres at the corner of Smith and N Bernis. The old park site has been sold and equipment removed. We are currently working on design and looking into a park grant that will help us improve the park to fit the needs of a growing community. Also, the city is going to add a second city park on Nelms Street. This park will be developed through fund raisers, donations, and grants, You may ask, why two parks. The reason is safety. Our city is divided by Holman (HWY 49B) and Union Pacific Railroad. Having one central location

creates a dangerous situation for children crossing railroad and Holman Street. Our current count of trains that run through our city daily is 12 to 17. Our current traffic count conducted by AR-DOT has an average traffic count on Holman around 5.000 cars dailv. City Council and I are going to try and make the parks beneficial for each area but offer different options. We would like to form a committee to help with fund raisers. If you are interested in helping just email your information to city hall or drop a 5 x 7 card with your information by city hall or in the night drop box.

The Library/Museum buildings have been purchased. Once current occupants have moved into their new building, the Library will be built in the north building and planning will start for the museum. We are working with Brookland East Lab students on the layout of the museum.

Property located at 307 N. Bernis was purchased and we are currently working on the detention pond. Rain has currently held work up, but it will continue once the area dries up a little. There will be a sidewalk on the south side of detention pond connecting Brookland Street to N. Bernis, allowing access to the proposed new park at the corner of Smith and N Bernis. Also to help with drainage in this area, larger culverts will be placed under Lynch Street at the Fordyce intersection. The ditch between Lynch and Holman will be cleaned out. The ditch from N Bernis to Holman, that runs on the south side of city hall, will be modified to help with drainage. Drainage ditch work will also begin in Northern Heights Subdivision and along what we call Dooley Ditch on the east side of city. These will be done in phases starting in 2019.

I, on behalf of our city, am going to reach out to state aid street funding and see if there is any money available to help us with improving the School Street and HWY 49 Intersection. City growth along with Brookland School growth has made this intersection dangerous, because there are no turn lanes or designated turn signals to allow traffic to move safely during peak travel times and school events. AR-DOT Street Aid usually only overlays city streets. However, there has been a movement to help development phase of streets. For safety reasons at this intersection, I will ask for funding to help improve this intersection through this program. We are also working with Senator Boozman's office trying to find federal grant money that can help with this issue. Another intersection that has become a serious issue is Holman (HWY 49B) and School Street. AR-DOT recently did a study on this intersection and we are waiting to hear their view of what possibly can be done to fix this situation.

The Holiday Seasons are upon us! Halloween is on October 31. Children will be out on the streets trick-or-treating and I encourage all residents to drive safely. Watch for announcements of Trunk or Treat events around our city. Thanksgiving is a time to be thankful for our family and the

blessings that we have received throughout the year. I encourage everyone to slow down and take a moment to enjoy time with family and friends.

Christmas is the time to be thankful to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and what his birth means to so many. New Years Eve a time to reflect on the events of the past year, learn from them and try to do better in the New Year that begins January 1, 2019.

As we go through this time, I want to ask everyone to remember those men and women in our military who so bravely and unselfishly, are not at home during this time. Instead, they are possibly on foreign soils fighting to protect the very freedoms we enjoy each day. Also, remember the first responders/police officers who serve daily or could even have to leave a family holiday meal to help someone in need. Whether you agree with the politics of our nation or not, please remember these men and women that put their lives on the line every day for our freedoms and to provide help to us when needed.

I pray everyone has a safe and Blessed Holiday Season.

Notes from the Police Dept:



While responding to calls, it is often difficult to locate houses due to the house number not being properly displayed. The ambulance and fire department personnel also have difficulty finding addresses of residents who are in need of immediate emergency assistance.

BPD wants to urge residents to repair or replace damaged house numbers or to purchase house numbers and place them on your house if your home doesn't have any, to make it easier to respond to your location in the event of an emergency.

Brookland Police Department also wants to urge motorists to please slowdown be cautious of young children along the streets as they are trick-or-treating.



**PREVENTION** 

In 2001, Brookland was put into an urban status with Jonesboro, due to the population having 1,000 residents per square mile. This required Brookland to obtain a MS-4 permit to regulate storm water within the city limits.

In April of 2009, Ordinance 2009-1 was passed which implemented the Storm Water Pollution Prevention and Erosion Control Plan for the City of Brookland to be in compliance with our MS-4 permit.

The objectives of this ordinance is to maintain and improve the quality of water impacted by the storm drainage system within our city; to prevent discharge of contaminated storm water runoff and illicit discharges from industrial, commercial, residential construction sites into the storm drainage system; to promote public awareness of the hazards involved in the improper discharge of trash, vard waste, lawn chemicals, pet waste,

wastewater, oil, petroleum, cleaning. and paint products. hazardous waste, sediment and other pollutants into storm drainage system; tο facilitate compliance with and federal state standards and permits by owners of construction sites: and to enable the city to comply with all federal and state laws and regulations applicable to the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permitting requirements for storm water discharge.
