From the Mayor's Desk: I pray everyone had a Blessed Christmas and Happy New Year! 2023, can you believe it is here? 2023 is going to be a very busy year for our city. Hwy 49 and N Oak Street sewer extension project has been bid out and will begin construction as soon as the contractor can get manholes, station. and supplies delivered. The concrete manholes and lift station may be as far out as April 2023. They checkina with other companies to see if this process of delivery can be shortened. The City of Brookland was awarded a new grant that will continue the sidewalk Holman from School Street north to Jessica Ln. This is phase 1 of a 3-phase project. The current sidewalk on Holman from School Street south to Smith Street will be continued to the corner of W Matthews and Holman.

Bids for the two smaller parks located at N Bernis/Smith and E Matthews/Nelms will run for the middle of January, and the bid opening will be around the middle of February. In January, the first bid package for the sports complex will be let for bid. This ad will run for two weekends with bid opening following around the first week of February. We will keep you posted on bid opening dates for all projects on the city website.

The Brookland City Hall and Police Department municipal complex building draft floor plan has been approved by Brookland City Council. This proposal will now go back to the architect for full plans to be drawn.

Brookland has several street repair projects for 2023. We

have applied for the State Aid Street Program funding in the amount of \$300,000.00. We turned this request in last year to overlay N Oak and E School Street but did not receive the funds. I talked with ARDOT and we are on the list again this year for these.

Harp's Grocery Store has submitted final plans to pull their permits to begin work. Harp's will also include a deli, fueling station, and more. We look forward to the start of the store project.

Brookland Shopping Center, located west of First Community Bank, currently has an insurance office and car wash open.

I am sure residents have noticed work that is going on at the old KUM & GO location. Southern Chef has purchased the building and is planning to open in late spring. Southern Chef will have gas and diesel.

There have been two new subdivisions announced for the City of Brookland. Horseshoe Creek located on east side of Whitten Creek Road (CR 741) north of W School Street will have approximately 80 lots. This property has been submitted for a rezone to R1 low density single residential. The other will be located on the south side of West School Street.

There is also funds allotted in the 2023 budget for another storm safe room to possibly be built at the corner of E Matthews and Nelms Street, on the lot where the original water tower used to be located.

With current businesses, new businesses, and new home developments the City of Brookland has positioned itself for a strong growing future. We

are blessed with the foundation of our school. Brookland School continues to be at the top of academics for the students. While maintaining this high priority goal of academics, Brookland has been able to put together championship sports Winning several teams. championships in 2022, good academic scores and a great faculty has students wanting to attend Brookland School, GO BEARCATS!

Finally, we have been able to fill some of our positions that we have had open such as the supervisor. street animal control/code enforcement. general laborer for street and utility departments. The past couple of years have been tough. Pandemic, inflation and a shortage of workforce has made each year's goals very tough to meet. As we go into 2023 our work force is positioned to better serve our community. Inflation we have NO control over. As of this newsletter is being written, fuel prices are down, hopefully it will continue to improve, and the cost of materials will also decrease. As you can see from parks, sidewalks, street repair, sewer extensions, city hall/pd subdivisions, building, new businesses and school additions, this year it is really going to be a busy year.
